

April Members Concert Hope and Resurrection

n Friday evening, April 23, the chapter presented a lovely concert entitled Hope and Resurrection which exhibited the talents of five chapter members in a series of organ pieces coupled with readings associated with Eastertide. Readers were chapter member James Hill and Subdean Ricki Moyer. Music was performed on the wonderful McManis pipe organ at Calvary Baptist Church. Denise Lanning opened with the stately Saraband (For the morning of Easter) by Herbert Howells. Two works by Louis Vierne were next: first the Choral from Symphony II op. 20 performed by Norman Sutphin followed by the beautiful Berceuse op.31 played by Kathryn Walsh. Linda Mack continued with the Choral-Improvisation on "Victimae paschali" by Charles Tournemire (transcribed by Maurice Duruflé). Last was the show-stopping Pageant by Leo Sowerby performed by Faythe Freese featuring a virtuoso pedal part. Twenty-four people attended in person and observed Covid protocols. The program was also streamed virtually with 107 listeners joining in. Kudos to Denise Lanning, Ricki Moyer and James Hill for developing the program and making it happen. Dale and James Nickell in Wheat Ridge

Friday, May 21 at 8:00 p.m. at Wheat Ridge United Methodist Church, 7530 West 38th Ave, Wheat Ridge, CO 80033, brothers Dale and James Nickell will present a free live concert. Dale Nickell, a graduate of Colorado State University and the Eastman School of Music, is Music Director and Organist at the First Presbyterian Church of Columbia, TN. James Nickell is a classical percussionist, currently studying at the Lamont School of Music of the University of Denver and working as a free-lance performer. The program will include organ pieces, piano pieces, music for piano and percussion, and percussion pieces.

Duruflé by St. Martin's

Friday June 4, at 7:30 p.m., the St. Martin's Chamber Choir, Timothy J. Kreuger, Artistic Director, will present a livestream performance of the Duruflé Requiem. Held in such high esteem as one of the most profound of all choral works, Krueger has felt that performing the Maurice Duruflé Requiem requires a level of artistic maturity and depth of human experience that he was not confident of possessing. Therefore, for the first time in its history, St. Martin's Chamber Choir performs this haunting and mystical work in the wake of the traumatic and difficult events of the last year, along with a handful of complementary shorter works. British organist Simon Jacobs accompanies the choir. Pre-concert lecture by Gregory Robbins, PhD, Professor, of History of Christianity and its Scriptures, Department of Religious Studies, University of Denver.
